Call to Order

The meeting of the Common Council was called to order by Mayor Maiurano at 7:04 p.m.

Mayor Maiurano presented a Certificate of Appreciation to Thomas R. LoPiccolo, Alderman, Ward 6, in recognition of his service on the Common Council. Mayor Maiurano announced that Ald. LoPiccolo will be serving on certain of the City's Boards and Commissions after leaving the Common Council.

Approval of minutes

Ald. Laughlin **moved** to approve the minutes of the regular meeting of November 20, 2012 and the Special Meetings of December 3 and December 11, 2012. Seconded by Ald. Bresina, duly approved ayes all.

Open Forum

Jason Miller, 127 South Broad Street, thanked City aldermen and staff for revising the proposed budget to lower the proposed property-tax increase. He said that taking money from reserves is not good in the long term and suggested the City investigate other savings, such as consolidation with the Town. [DC: The City has explored consolidation with the Town and County regularly for many years.] He also suggested independent consultants be hired to audit the City's efficiencies. [DC: Such independent audits have been performed regularly by the City.]

Joseph Biviano, 86 East Main Street, repeated his remarks made at the public hearing on December 11, 2012. He said the City requires a financial plan to be prepared for the enormous increases the State mandates are placing on local governments. He admitted that the City cannot stay within the 2% property-tax cap when the State increases mandated contributions to the pension plan from less than \$100,000 to over \$1.1 million.

Barbara Collins, 195 Pratt Road, a property owner in the City of Norwich, expressed her concerns with information she has received on gas-grilling companies who plan to purchase massive amounts of water for their operations from the City of Norwich. She noted that each gas well requires thousands of tanker truckloads of water, and further thousands of truckloads of wastewater, which will be trucked over our roads. These roads are not designed for such heavy traffic and their upkeep is the financial responsibility of the local governments. She stated that selling our water resources for short-term gains puts future generations at risk. She also questioned using herbicides to control water weeds in Chenango Lake.

Mary Ellen Heaton, 6 Northrup Avenue, repeated the concerns of Ms. Collins, noted that most information on gas-drilling comes from gas-drilling companies and may show bias, and offered newspapers on the subject to the Common Council.

T.J. Conant, 61 Henry Street, noted that the City doesn't have the employment opportunities that were available when he was young. He urged consolidation of services with the Town and County. Mayor Maiurano replied that the City has repeatedly explored consolidation with the Town, including having several studies done to show what benefits could ensue from various consolidations. However, such efforts require the cooperation of the other communities, who have not been willing to discuss further consolidations. Mayor Maiurano noted that though the economic crisis has affected every community, the City of Norwich has held its own and has not suffered drastic service cuts like so many other cities. He

reviewed the efforts he has made to bring new businesses into the City, that empty business buildings and storefronts have been filled, and employment opportunities are increasing. He also noted that in recent years the City has been able to grow its reserves, unlike previous administrations, which imposed even higher property-tax increases and were unable to grow reserves. Having healthy reserves to go to in order to be able to decrease the burden on property-tax payers is in fact a sign of the City's financial health.

Sharon Pelosi, 141 North Broad Street, has not attended Council meetings in the past but asked why she is not aware of the budget-development process. She said that increased property taxes make it difficult for investment-property owners like herself to make capital improvements. She noted that the City does not have the large tax base it enjoyed during the 1970s.

Hearing no further comments, the Mayor closed the Open Forum at 7:45 p.m.

RESOLUTION #104-2012 ADOPTING PROPOSED LOCAL LAW NO. (A) OF 2012 - TAX LEVY

Ald. Bresina introduced the following and **moved** its adoption:

WHEREAS, the Common Council received proposed Local Law No. (A) of 2012 on December 3, 2012, to override the tax levy limit established in General Municipal Law §3-c; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held on December 11, 2012, in connection with said proposed local law; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that Local Law No. (A) of 2012 to override the tax levy limit established in General Municipal Law §3-c, as presented to the Common Council on December 3, 2012, be and hereby is adopted, and is hereby designated as Local Law No. 1 of 2012.

LOCAL LAW NO. 1 OF 2012

A LOCAL LAW TO OVERRIDE THE TAX LEVY LIMIT ESTABLISHED IN GENERAL MUNICIPAL LAW §3-c

BE IT ENACTED by the Common Council of the City of Norwich as follows:

Section 1. Legislative Intent

It is the intent of this local law to allow the City of Norwich to adopt a budget for the fiscal year commencing January 1, 2013, that requires a real property tax levy in excess of the "tax levy limit" as defined by General Municipal Law § 3-c.

Section 2. Authority

This local law is adopted pursuant to subdivision 5 of General Municipal Law §3-c, which expressly authorizes a local government's governing body to override the property tax cap for the coming fiscal year by the adoption of a local law approved by a vote of sixty percent (60%) of said governing body.

Section 3. Tax Levy Limit Override

The Common Council of the City of Norwich, County of Chenango, is hereby authorized to adopt a budget for the fiscal year commencing January 1, 2013, that requires a real property tax levy in excess of the amount otherwise prescribed in General Municipal Law §3-c.

Section 4. Severability

If a court determines that any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, or part of this local law or the application thereof to any person, firm or corporation, or circumstance is invalid or unconstitutional, the court's order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of this local law, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, or part of this local law or in its application to the person, individual, firm or corporation or circumstance, directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment or order shall be rendered.

Section 5. Effective date

This local law shall take effect immediately upon filing with the Secretary of State.

WHEREAS, the unfunded mandate for exorbitant increases in the amounts charged by the State for employer contributions to the State Retirement System necessitates that the minimal required payment from the City of Norwich for the State fiscal year ending March 31, 2013 be paid by February 1, 2013; and

WHEREAS, funds are required for setting aside an adequate amount from the City's current fiscal year ending December 31, 2012 toward helping meet the minimal amount due in the City's 2013 fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, a supplemental appropriation of \$225,000 is needed to increase the original budgeted amount of \$250,000 for funding the reserve to a total of \$475,000 for that purpose; now, therefore be it

Discussion: Ald. Deierlein stated that he felt it was difficult to grant cost-of-living increases to non-union members of the City staff while raising property taxes, and he is not in favor of the increase. Ald. Laughlin stated that it is not fair that the few non-union City employees should be punished because their cost-of-living increases are not contracted. Mayor Maiurano noted that the proposed increase has virtually no impact at all on the proposed property-tax increase.

RESOLUTION #114-2012 CITY/COUNTY TAX LEVY FOR 2013

Ald. Bresina introduced the following and **moved** its adoption:

WHEREAS, the taxes to be levied by Chenango County for collection by the City of Norwich during 2013 total \$2,174,719.46; and
