

Gentlemen:-

The Transcript has been the official paper of the City of Rensselaer, since January 1st, 1930.

Its duties you no doubt know are to print the minutes of the Common Council, Board of Education, tax sales, tax redemption notices, and all legal notices such as bids for materials and supplies, bond sales, etc.

For this work the Transcript receives \$125.00 per month or \$1500.00 per year, which is very meagre compensation for the amount of work performed.

The first six months of 1930 the paper printed 20,975 lines, figured at the papers legal rate of 8 cents per line this would amount to \$1678.00. However, we only received \$1500.00 for the entire year. Since that time the lineage has increased steadily and has been upwards of 3,000 lines per month for many months. However, last month it passed all previous records totaling 6,001 lines.

For your information, the City of Albany pays its official paper, The Times Union 14 cents per line; the City of Troy, The Troy Times 10 cents per line; the City of Cohoes, The Cohoes American 9 cents per line, while the Transcript only received last month .02082 per line. The Troy Records'

Memorandum

At a conference at The Bayer Company Inc' Office on March 6, 1934, at 2 P.M. attended by Aldermen Pratt, Raymond, Hoogkamp, Special Committee of Aldermen, and Mr. McDermott, Dr. Hiemenz and Mr. Hammerli to ascertain if The Bayer Company is willing to convey part of their land on the West side of Columbia Turnpike, extending Easterly to the New York Central RR tracks for the purpose of widening Columbia St., and requesting the approximate cost to the City for that purpose.

The strip required for this purpose will extend ~~south~~ Easterly about 60 ft. on Belmore Place and extend Easterly along Columbia Turnpike to the junction of the Turnpike and the N.Y.C. RR Co. property and proceeding along the Westerly line of the RR property to a point opposite a point of the N.Y.C. property South of the existing overhead bridge 105.84 ft., which strip is roughly estimated to contain about 2/3 acre. The Bayer Company stated that it is willing to go along with the City in this widening project. Tentatively and subject to the approval of the Home Office, it was stated The Bayer Company would accept reimbursement for this land at the rate of the Assessed Valuation.

Rensselaer, N. Y.

Gentlemen:

It gives me great pleasure at this time to thank you for your quick action in passing the resolution introduced at the last meeting by Alderman Fogarty authorizing the City Engineer to mend the leak in the water pipe on Elm Street of this City.

The hole was dug and the water shut off in thirty six hours after the resolution was voted upon.

It seems to me that some one in the City should have the authority to go ahead when an emergency exists without bringing a matter like this up before your Honorable Body.

The condition of the street has been a disgrace for the past three weeks. The ice and snow had made it impossible to proceed without danger. It was remarkable that no one was hurt.

Now after the ice and snow has left the sidewalk several of them are undermined and heaved. By the time March with its snow and April with its rain the sidewalks that are not now undermined will be from the constant flow of April rains.

Is it fair to us that we must replace these sidewalks when they are only a few years old? I am sure the City will not expect us to stand that extra expense when it was through no fault of ours and could have been avoided if there was some one in authority who could give the command to go ahead without referring the matter to you. This could have been taken care of before the cold weather came on.




TO ALL FEDERAL DEPARTMENTS SUPERVISING FEDERAL PROJECTS:

TO ALL STATE CIVIL WORKS ADMINISTRATORS:


We have today notified the Federal Departments that the attached list of Federal Civil Works projects are to be terminated in your State on the night of February 15th.

The purpose of issuing these instructions is to reduce the total number of workers on Civil Works projects in your State by the number employed on these projects. These individuals may be re-assigned to other projects providing the employment of other workers is terminated to exactly offset those re-assigned so that the net number of workers is decreased by the exact number of workers on this project. The Civil Works Administration is prepared, if funds are made available by Congress, to authorize the several states to continue these projects as State or Local projects beyond February 15th wherever necessary until they are completed or brought to a state of completion that reasonably safeguards the work heretofore done.

All tools, materials, and other equipment purchased from Civil Works funds must be turned over immediately upon the termination of a project to the office of the nearest Civil Works Administration.

A local law to amend Chapter 69 of the Laws of 1915 entitled "An Act to revise the Charter of the City of Rensselaer" in relation to the Common Council of the City of Rensselaer as to its organization and procedure.

Be it enacted by the Common Council of the City of Rensselaer as follows:

Section 1. Section 66 of Chapter 69 of the Laws of 1915 entitled "An Act to Revise the Charter of the City of Rensselaer" is here superseded and enacted as a local law, amended, respectively, to read as follows:

Section 66. Organization procedure. The president of the Common Council and the aldermen from the respective wards of said city, shall constitute the common council thereof. At all meetings of the common council each alderman present shall have one vote. The president of the common council shall be the presiding officer of the common council. The president of the common council shall have a vote as alderman thereof, but when he shall vote as an alderman he shall have no casting vote on a tie, and for the purposes as provided by this act shall be deemed an alderman.

The common council shall hold regular or stated meetings on the first and third Wednesday (Tuesday) evening at eight o'clock, in each month, in the common council rooms, and at such other times as they shall by resolution prescribe.

The mayor, president of the common council or any three aldermen may call special meetings by notice in writing served personally upon the other members of the common council or left at their usual places of abode.

The common council shall determine the rules of its own proceedings and be judges of the election and qualifications of its members.

The common council may at any regular meeting elect one of its members president pro tempore to act during the temporary absence or disability of the president and who shall be president of the common council in case of a permanent vacancy in that office.

The attendance of absent members may be compelled by the common

entry of a resolution and order in the minutes directing the chief of police or any police officer of the city to arrest such absent member and take him before the common council at a meeting at which said member was absent or at the next or subsequent meeting of the common council, to answer for his neglect.

A majority of the common council shall be a quorum for the transaction of business, but a smaller number may adjourn from time to time.

A majority of the aldermen present and voting at any meeting of the Common council at which a quorum shall be present, shall be sufficient to pass any resolution or ordinance, except that no resolution authorizing or involving the expenditure of money or collection of money by tax or assessment shall pass unless it shall receive the assent of a majority of the aldermen in office, except as otherwise provided in this act.

The ayes and noes shall be called and recorded on all resolutions and appointments.

All meetings of the common council shall be public except where the public interest requires secrecy, but no vote shall be taken in secret or in executive sessions thereof.

Section 2. This local law shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED, "BUILDING CODE OF THE CITY OF RENSSELAER" IN RELATION TO THE INSTALLATION OF FUEL OIL TANKS.

Section 139-Sub-division 3-A of an Ordinance duly enacted by the Common Council of the City of Rensselaer on the 22 day of December, 1922 entitled, "Building Code of the City of Rensselaer" as amended, is hereby amended to read as follows:

3. Tanks containing oil for use in connection with light fuel oil burners shall be located as follows:

(a) No tanks having a capacity of more than 270⁵ gallons each may be located in the cellar or basement of any building unless each of said tanks with an individual capacity in excess of 270⁵ gallons and unless all tanks in excess of the one or those with a combined capacity of 270⁵ gallons shall be completely enclosed by not less than 8 inches in thickness of brick or concrete or some similar substantial fire-proof material and in such cases all spaces between such brick or concrete or other approved manner or type of walls, and the said tank or tanks shall be located not nearer than seven feet from any open fire or flame.




