Dear Sir:- As I notified you over the phone, there is a space between my back fence and the side walk which is very dangerous, due to the fact that during the last heavy rain storm your man holes at the foot of Dale Street and Fourth overflowed and washed out about 20 cubic feet of earth from under my back fence and sidewalk and along side of the sidewalk.

It is a well known fact that the last storm was terrific but only three or four weeks prior to that date when a slight storm was experienced these same man holes were unable to carry off the water and part of my yard was damaged by the overflow.

If you can not have your city employees repair the damage to my back fence, and through almost my whole yard, I wish to file a claim for \$25.00 (twenty-five) Dollars in order to restore my yard to its former condition.

The gentleman living in the house had just cleaned the whole yard and cut the grass but everything is now in a disgraceful condition, but we understand that you are not responsible for the rain fall.

I call your attention to the condition of the space between sidewalk and fence because anyone could be seriously injured if they fall in the hole left by the flood.

To resurface the Columbia Turnpike also known as Columbia Street from Akin Avenue to the Boston and Albany Bridge, with bituminous macadam and concrete and to make the necessary incidental repairs to said Columbia Turnpike, including the enlargement of the turnout or intersection to or at South Street.

4. To lay gas and water mains on those said streets and avenues above mentioned in which no gas or water mains are now laid.

5. To lay service and house connections pipes with all sewers, gas and water mains already laid and from said gas and water mains, to be laid in that part of said Streets and avenues above designated, in front of each separate lot or piece of property suitable for building purposes, to a point within the curb line, and be it further

All that tract or parcel of land, situate, lying and being in the City of Rensselaer, formerly Town and Village of Greenbush, County of Rensselaer, and State of New York, being the northerly twenty-five feet of lots Nos. twenty nine (29) Thirty (30) Thirty-one (31) and Thirty-two (32) in Block C., as designated on a map made by George W. Carpenter for Jeremiah VanRensselaer, in 1850, and bounded as follows; On the north by Catherine Street on the east by First Street, on the south by a line parallel with and distant twenty-five (25) feet southerly from the southerly line of Catherine Street, and on the west by a line parallel with and distant one hundred twenty feet easterly from the easterly line of Broadway, formerly Rensselaer Street, being twenty-five (25) feet wide on First Street in front, and the same in the rear and about ninety

six (96) feet deep.
