PRESENTATION OF PETITIONS

Plans and specifications for a garageto be erected by George VanAllen on lot number 150 located on the west side of Fourth Street City of Rensselaer, N. Y. are included.

Garage having concrete foundation and concrete floor, 4X6 sills, 2 X 4 Studding, 2 X 6 rafters to be covered with 1 X 8 ship lap, recovered with fire proof asphalt shingles, doors and windows as shown on plans.

Alderman Younghans moved that the President appoint a Committee of two to investigate.

Gentlemen:- We the undersigned CITIZENS of the City of Rensselaer, STATE OF NEW YORK, residing on Second Street, protest against the acceptance of, and any payment being made for, the concrete sidewalk laid on said Street, on the east side from McNaughton Avenue to Church Street on the west side from McNaughton Avenue to Fowler Avenue. Our reasons for the protest are as follows:-

1- The specifications provide that the walk shall be placed in panels or sections of the size of four (4) by four (4) feet, with joints between of one-eighth (1/8) of an inch in width clear through to the foundation.

The walk as laid is not according to the printed specifications but is four (4) feet by approximately five (5) feet. The joints in the wearing surface in many places are anywhere from one (1) inch to the three (3) inches away from the joints in the bottom course, and as a result cracks have already appeared in several places, and in at least one case the wearing surface is entirely broken away from the bottom course.

2- Furthermore;- The specifications provide that the forms used shall be accurately placed to line and grade and rigidly braced, A glance will convince anyone that this was not done.

3- Furthermore:- The specifications provide that just before the concrete is placed the foundation of cinders or gravel shall be saturated with water to prevent it from absorbing water from the concrete.

This was not done

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4- Furthermore:- The specifications provide that as soon as the wearing surface is placed it shall be screeded with straight edge and brought to one plane.

Many of the panels are decidedly not on one plane, since it is impossible to do a good job after dark by lantern light.

5- Furthermore:- The specifications provide that upon completion the walks shall be covered with tar paper or other materials slightly raised from the surface, and after the concrete has reached hard set it shall be sprinkled two or three times a day with garden hose or sprinkler for at least a week.

Here again the specifications were not enforced, Some of the walk upon completion, but not all, was covered with tarpaper, but it was not raised from the surface. On the contrary it was held down with bricks, pieces of lumber etc. It was not sprinkled two or three times a day, but just once and that after the entire walk was laid.

We bring this important matter to the attention of your honored believing it to be your duty to so act as to protect the interest of all who are affected thereby.

Dear Sir:- Your letter calling our attention to the resolution of the Common Council, passed at its meeting on May 5th, 1922, and supplementary letter received. I referred same to our home office and the President of our Company wished me to advise you that it is the practice of the Company in planning its improvements and extensions, to place order for materials and supplies in January of each year so as to have proper early delivery for the improvement. Therefore, provision could not be made for the Forbes Avenue extension under the resolution of May 5th, 1922, While pipe mills are running capacity, they have in stock certain sizes, but will not assure us of delivery of our full requirements for this work for any definite time. This, because of the mill condition and of transportation difficulties will be found in procuring

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tion embargoes. The same difficulties will be found in procuring the delivery of the necessary hydrants and other fittings required for the job. Our Company is most willing to comply with the resolution, but desires frankly to say that it doubts if the work can be completed in time to be of any service in any building operations that may be commenced this fall in the vicinity of the extension.

To encourage any building and in compliance with the purpose of the resolution, the Company at its own expense is willing to make one or two inch extension for service to any new buildings that may be erected within four or five hundred feet of the present main.

In view of the conditions and season, the Company requests extension of time under said resolution to the early Spring of 1923. If this request is granted, it will mean a saving to the City of Hydrant rental of at least \$170.00, and the Company is quite sure that it will be enabled to save at least 10 per cent in the cost of the work which ultimately works to the advantage of the City at Large.

In view of the above, I trust that you will recommend to the Common Council the passage of a suitable resolution granting the Company a reasonable extension of time. Yours truly,
