WHEREAS, the Deeper Hudson Committee, composed of representatives of at least eight municipalities in the capital district of the State of New York, is engaged, with the assistance of specialists in port development matters, in making a comprehensive survey intended to show the necessity and wisdom of and justification for extensive improvement of the Hudson River by the Federal Government which will make it possible for ocean going vessels to navigate the Hudson up to the head of tidewater at the Federal dam at Troy; and

WHEREAS, it is confidently believed that the creation of a port, or ports, with modern and efficient terminals, wharves and handling facilities, in said district will promote the interests and growth of the numerous communities in the capital district and will prove of great value and economy to the users of shipping not only in that district but in a large section of the United States; and

WHEREAS, it is desirable and necessary that a definite pledge of interest in, and support of, the project upon the part of the municipalities most immediately affected by the desired improvements, together with a definite plan for the provision, development and operation of suitable port and terminal facilities, should be submitted to the Board of Engineers, U. S. A. for their consideration; and

WHEREAS, this Common Council of the City of Rensselaer is heartily in favor of the project and proposes to encourage and support it to the fullest extent of its present statutory powers; and

WHEREAS, it is realized that the purpose and object of the proponents of the project can best be accomplished through concerted and definite action and the submission of a brief on the project prepared by port specialists supported by uniform resolutions adopted by the most immediately interested municipalities; be it

RESOLVED, That this Common Council of the City of Rensselaer will, at the proper time and insofar as lies in its power, advocate, and do its ~~utmost~~ utmost to secure the enactment by the Legislature of the State of New York of legislation authorizing,

1, The creation of the Upper Hudson Port District, with bounds to be later determined but including the cities of Albany, Troy, Rensselaer, Cohoes, Schenectady, Watervliet and Mechanicville and the Villages of Green Island, Castleton, Waterford, Colonie and Ravena;

2, The Creation of the Upper Hudson Port District Advisory Committee of approximately thirty members, to be composed of representatives of the municipalities included within the Port District appointed by the Mayors, Village Presidents and Town Supervisors of the several Civil Divisions in said District, as the case may be, on some equitable basis of population, location and financial obligation for limited terms:

3, The creation of the Upper Hudson Port Commission to be composed of five members elected by the Advisory Committee from its membership which Commission is to have authority over the development, control and operation of port facilities in the Port District, including the power to:

(a) Fix amounts of financial obligations of the various Civil Divisions in the Port District with respect to the Common Facilities;

(b) Incur expense and disburse funds for the common purpose;

(c) Determine upon a building, operating and financial program;

(d) Determine upon the location, type, size and construction of requisite port facilities, subject to the approval of the Board of Engineers, U. S. A.

(e) Execute contracts and issue and sell obligations of the Port District;

(f) Operate all common port facilities and distribute operation profits to the contributing municipalities on an equitable basis;

(g) Create and maintain a traffic bureau;

(h) Such other matters and things as may be advisable or necessary to make the project successful and profitable.

But such legislation shall be conditioned upon a report being made by the United States Board of Army Engineers on Rivers and Harbors in favor of the project, and the approval of said report by the Secretary of War,

and be it further

RESOLVED, that a certified copy of these resolutions be transmitted to the Deeper Hudson Committee for submission with its engineer's brief to the Board of Engineers, U. S. A.

The Erection and equipment of the Fire Alarm Station on East St. in the City of Rensselaer, New York, together with installation of equipment in the respective fire houses.

WHEREAS, contracts for such erection and installation have been duly entered into and a portion of said work having been completed and

WHEREAS by an act to revise the Charter of the City of Rensselaer, chapter 69 of the Laws of 1915, said City is authorized to issue bonds to pay the cost of such improvements and,

WHEREAS the cost of said improvements is to be born by the City-at-large and that the said cost is not to exceed the sum of Thirty Thousand (\$30,000.) Dollars.

NOW, therefore, be it Resolved that the Common Council of the City of Rensselaer for the purpose of paying the cost of said improvements to be born by the City-at-large there shall be issued Thirty Thousand (\$30,000.) Dollars in improvement bonds of the City of Rensselaer of the denomination of One Thousand (\$1000) Dollars each, dated January 1st, 1924, nukbered fron one to thirty, both inclusive and maturing in numerical order 2 bonds on the first day of January in each of the years from 1926 to 1940 both inclusive; that said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of four and one-half (4½) percent per annum payable semi-abbually on the first days of January and July in each year and shall have interest coupons attached.

That said bonds shall be signed by the Mayor and sealed with the corporate seal of the City, Attested by the City Clerk and the interest coupons shall be signed with the ~~facsimile~~ facsimile signature of the City Clerk and that both principal and interest shall be payable in gold coin of the United States of America of the present weight and fineness or its equivalany in lawful money of the United States at the office of the City Treasurer in the City of Rensselaer or at the Rensselaer County Bank in the City of Rensselaer, New York at the option of the holder.

It is hereby certified, recited and declared that all acts, conditions and things required to exist, to happen and to be performed precedent to and in the issuance of this bond, exist, have happened and have been performed in due time, form and manner as required by law; that the issue of bonds of which this is one, together with all other indebtedness of said City, is within every debt and other limit prescribed by the Constitution and Laws of the State of New York: that due

provision has been made for raising annually by tax on the taxable property of said city a sum sufficient to pay the principal and interest of this bond as the same respectively become due and payable.
