### STATEMENTS AND COMMENTS FROM MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC FOR ITEMS NOT ON THE AGENDA

George Steward (30 Gilmore Road) said he wanted to convey his ongoing frustration and disappointment with the scheduling policy of this meeting. He continued to say the last four meetings that have occurred by this body have begun anywhere from 7:00 to 10:30 at night. It is those kinds of situations that would warrant and require this body to meet on two different nights. He said it discourages public participation in this process. The public does not know when you are actually going to meet. Two weeks ago, you had a public hearing on the budget. He had something to do and came here at 7:25 and hoped he would be part of that process. At 7:25 the meeting had already been adjourned. He knows the policy states that at the business meeting will begin at 7:30 or immediately following the agenda meeting. It does not work with transparency and trying to get the public to participate and to condition them to know that you will be here at a specific time that they can come in and talk to you. He asked Council to consider re-evaluating the timing of the meetings and go back to agenda meeting one night and the business meeting the next night, or if an agenda meeting goes short, wait until 7:30 to start the business meeting. President Keyes-Maloney thanked him for his comments.

Thomas Tighue (10 Boleyn Court) echoed Mr. Steward's comments. He picked up both agenda's today and wrote a bunch of notes down and suggestions for the

budget, only to realize now that it is only to talk about the amendments to the budget. He said it is frustrating. President Keyes-Maloney stated that we have had a number of public sessions. Two weeks ago, we had a hearing on the introduced budget and we allow the public to speak. She further went on to say that we have had enhanced participation trying to compress the meetings into one evening. President Keyes-Maloney said we would take his comments into consideration. President Keyes-Maloney said to be perfectly clear, the public has the opportunity to make comments on the budget, in terms of anything within it, because the basis of the budget is what was introduced plus what was amended.

**CY2015 BUDGET**

**1. PUBLIC HEARING ON THE CY2015 AMENDED BUDGET**

President Keyes-Maloney asked for a motion to open the public hearing on the amended CY2015 budget. Councilwoman Steward moved to open the public hearing, seconded by Councilwoman Wollert. It was agreed by a unanimous voice vote.

Ron Prykanowski (16 Thurston Avenue) asked Council to go over the amendments for the public’s edification. President Keyes-Maloney deferred to CFO Mustafa who explained the amendments. The budget was amended to include Clean Communities Grant, Click It or Ticket Grant, Recycling Tonnage Grant, Cops and Shops Grant, adjustment to police and fire timing system for a judgement for a delayed involvement, there were some increases to operating accounts for our first responders, one being police for e-ticketing, the EMS for per diem salaries for a second ambulance and then there was additional expense for the volunteer fire fighters incentive program. There were some changes to the State Aid, it was reclassifying the numbers for 2015, offsetting some of those expenses were additional increase in surplus and a bump in our hotel tax and anticipated revenue by \$20,000. The amount to be raised by taxes stayed the same. There were some minor adjustments in the budget, but nothing impacting the taxpayers that they weren’t already aware of.

George Steward (30 Gilmore Road) started by thanking the Clerk’s Office. He went to the website looking for the budget amendment resolution and the amended budget and could not find it. He went to the Clerk’s office and the Clerk provided him with both documents. He feels like he should be allowed to talk about anything within the budget, not just the amended budget. President Keyes-Maloney said that because the underlying budget is part of the discussion, you have the right to express your thoughts and feelings about the budget as a whole. Mr. Steward spoke about the surplus and the balancing of the in-cap budget. He said for the last four years, you have used anywhere from 1.8 million to almost 3 million dollars every year to balance your in-cap budget. He said

Council is the one responsible for the document. President Keyes-Maloney said that she thought the CFO gave him the opportunity to answer any of his questions. Mr. Steward responded that she in fact did answer his questions, but he doesn't want to talk to the person who constructed the budget, he wants to talk to the legislative body of this township that has the checks and balances to oversee what they (Administration) are introducing to you (Council) and then you have the ultimate responsibility to make sure that this spending plan is what Ewing needs. Mr. Steward said this year's surplus is going to be \$2,250,000.00 which is very close to the number you have had to use over the last four years to balance the budget. President Keyes-Maloney said that we have been significantly below cap for the last several years and in fact will continue to do so with this budget. Mr. Steward said that we are one of the few municipalities that are raising taxes this year. He said he would have hoped that they would have come together as a body and had a philosophy that said it stops here. He said he believes that there is a lot of "fluff" in the budget and long term debt. He stated that they can't do this same scenario next year and he hopes that his words will help them reconsider the budget.

Thomas Tighue (10 Boleyn Court) said he did see part of the budget, without the vehicles. But, he said he heard about the vehicles and asked why we can't motor pool. President Keyes-Maloney responded that as much as we have vehicles designated to individual departments, they do form a basis of a pool. As an example she said that the CFO may need a vehicle and may in fact borrow from the Health Department or Construction. Mr. Tighue stated that he knows that the police have certain requirements but he has seen in other municipalities that they don't have Tahoes to drive around in. President Keyes-Maloney said that her understanding is that the onboard requirements have increased substantially and at the same time the Old Crown Victoria they don't even make anymore. Some of the smaller cars would be too small to do all the things we want to do onboard and she used the e-ticketing system as an example. She thanked Mr. Tighue for his comments.

President Keyes-Maloney asked for a motion to close the public hearing on the amended CY2015 budget. Councilwoman Wollert moved to close the public hearing, seconded by Councilman Baxter. It was agreed by a unanimous voice vote.

It specifies that these particular bus stops are located along State, not Municipal highways and also adds appropriate titling and indexing to the actual provision to make it easier to navigate. 2. The Clerk read (Ordinance #15-16) A BOND ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR VARIOUS CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS IN AND BY THE TOWNSHIP OF EWING, IN THE COUNTY OF MERCER, NEW JERSEY, APPROPRIATING \$4,204,802 THEREFOR AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$3,994,562 BONDS OR NOTES OF THE TOWNSHIP TO FINANCE PART OF THE COST THEREOF.

President Keyes-Maloney stated that we had a discussion at the agenda session. Amongst the items located within this bond ordinance are everything from an upgrade to our dispatch/radio room, significant amount of road improvements, a number of vehicles that are due to replace old vehicles. In addition there is a large improvement at the Community Center, the roof in particular. For all three fire houses there will be self-contained breathing apparatus bottles as they can't be used past this year if we don't replace them. We have a number of significant items including a tig welder in the department of public works that will allow us to do repairs to the bleachers, also a specific track that we had a brief discussion about associated with green acres at 146 Scotch Road that will allow us to acquire additional green acres funding and more importantly solves some individual problems that we need to associated with open space. President Keyes-Maloney asked if Council had any questions. There were none. She asked if the public had any questions on the Ordinance. Ron Prykanowski (16 Thurston Avenue) asked about some of the vehicles that need replacement, he urged Council and Administration to get green vehicles. He doesn't think that Construction needs a Tahoe. He said that other towns don't have these big vehicles and that we want to be a sustainable and green township. President Keyes-Maloney said that in the past we have specifically focused them on something smaller like a Jeep Liberty as an example. He said these vehicles are a little bit ostentatious.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Township Council of the Township of Ewing that **Chapter 225, VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC, § 225-64. Schedule XVII: Bus Stops** of the Code of the Township of Ewing is hereby amended as follows:

Section 1: **Chapter 225, VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC, § 225-64. Schedule XVII: Bus Stops** of the Code of the Township of Ewing is hereby amended that, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 39:4-8(e), the following described locations are designated as bus stops:

**§ 225-64. Schedule XVII: Bus Stops**

**Along ~~Municipal~~ County Roadways**

1. Along Parkside Avenue (County Road 634), southbound, on the westerly side thereof at:
  - A. Buttonwood Drive – (Far Side)  
Beginning at the southerly curb line of Buttonwood Drive and extending 100 feet southerly therefrom.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mayor and Council of the Township of Ewing will enforce the needed traffic regulations governing the aforementioned bus stop locations and provide the necessary police security to ensure the safety of the traveling public.

Section 2. The Municipal Clerk is hereby instructed to forward a certified adopted copy of this Ordinance to NJ TRANSIT, One Penn Plaza East, Newark, New Jersey 07105-2246; Attn: Joe De Mauro and also to the Mercer County Board of Chosen Freeholders for a concurring Ordinance since Parkside Avenue is a County Roadway.

~~Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect upon approval of the Commissioner of Transportation as provided by law.~~

**STATEMENT**

The Clerk stated that there would be a walk on item and read the item as #4 A Resolution authorizing the Township of Ewing to enter a settlement in the matter of Ed Stier v. Township of Ewing. Attorney Cannon explained that this is a settlement of a lawsuit instituted by the Trustee (Stier) in the bankruptcy court for the bankruptcy of Birdsall Engineering. Birdsall Engineering bought the unpaid receivables of CMX, which was the township's previous engineering company, which went bankrupt. When CMX went bankrupt, Birdsall bought all of their account receivables and then they went bankrupt. The Trustee sued everyone on the accounts receivable list, including the township. This is the settlement of that amount at about 29 cents on the base dollar.

4. The Clerk read (Resolution #15R-110) A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE TOWNSHIP OF EWING TO ENTER A SETTLEMENT IN THE MATTER OF ED STIER V. TOWNSHIP OF EWING.
