


RESOLUTION NO. 84 OF 2017

Moved by:



A Resolution authorizing the submission of a grant application for a Dauphin County Local Share Municipal Grant under the Pennsylvania Gaming Act for the purpose of funding five different pieces of equipment for the Bureau of Police.

WHEREAS, the City of Harrisburg (the "City") desires to purchase safety and communications equipment, including fifteen plate carriers that can be worn over uniforms of police officers to stop a high powered rifle round, eleven portable radios with a higher bandwidth to replace the current obsolete portable radios, six short-range rifles for use by the crisis response team, eleven vehicle radios compatible with the County system to replace obsolete vehicle radios, and two new model motorcycles to replace two older models in their fleet; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Pennsylvania Gaming Act, Dauphin County, Pennsylvania (the "County") receives a portion of the gross terminal revenue generated from the slot machines at the Hollywood Casino at Penn National, for which it is authorized to award as municipal grants; and

WHEREAS, the City intends to submit an application to request \$200,000 in grant funds from the County for the purpose of funding these five different pieces of equipment for the Bureau of Police; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the grant program requirements, the grant application must be submitted to the County no later than September 1, 2017; and

WHEREAS, a copy of the grant application is attached and incorporated as "Exhibit A."

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT AND IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HARRISBURG, that the submission of a grant application for a Dauphin County Local Share Municipal Grant under the Pennsylvania Gaming Act for the purpose of funding five different pieces of equipment for the Bureau of Police is authorized.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mayor, City Controller and other appropriate City officials are authorized and directed to take all steps necessary to further effectuate the purpose of this resolution.

COUNTY LOCAL SHARE APPLICATION NARRATIVE

Introduction

Due to the City of Harrisburg being in fiscal distress and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania Act 47 program, the needs of the Harrisburg Bureau of Police are vast. The Harrisburg Bureau of Police is requesting five different pieces of equipment for which the need is the greatest. The total ask for these five items will be \$200,000. They are described below in detail and are ranked in order of priority.

First Priority: Plate Carriers

From time to time, the City of Harrisburg Bureau of Police will encounter an active shooter scenario that involves high-powered rifles. The typical bulletproof vests that are worn by police officers are designed to stop a handgun bullet, as this is the type of weapon that is most encountered in an active shooter scenario. Currently, the Harrisburg Bureau of Police do not possess any protection for high powered rifles. This puts Harrisburg police officers in a vulnerable position in such a scenario.

In order to better protect the lives of Harrisburg police officers, the Harrisburg Bureau of Police wishes to purchase plate carriers which will be carried in the vehicles of first responders. These plate carriers can be worn over the uniforms of police officers and are capable of stopping a high powered rifle round. The outcome is that first responders will be better protected and their lives will be saved. Another direct outcome of purchasing plate carriers is that first responders will feel more protected and will be better able to do their jobs with the added layer of protection. A total of 30 plate carriers will be purchased for use in the vehicles of first responders only.

Second Priority: Portable Radios

Portable radios are essential pieces of equipment to the work of police officers. Portable radios are used in a wide variety of functions and often help to save the lives of officers through quick and easy communication. The portable radios that are carried by Harrisburg Bureau of Police officers are beyond their useful life and need to be replaced. The current portable radios are over ten years old and are obsolete. The Harrisburg police officers need portable radios that are not breaking frequently and have a higher bandwidth in order to be supported by the County system.

The Harrisburg Bureau of Police is requesting 12-15 portable radios from the Dauphin County Gaming Advisory Board. Moving forward, the Harrisburg Bureau of Police will put these radios on a replacement schedule. These portable radios would give Harrisburg police officers the latest technology. This purchase will lead to better communication within the Harrisburg Bureau of Police, other law enforcement agencies in nearby jurisdictions, and Dauphin County. These radios will help the Harrisburg police officers to solve more crimes and save more lives (both of victims and the police officers themselves). Since crimes often cross jurisdictions, this purchase is also a benefit to Dauphin County.

Third Priority: Rifles

Adequate weapons are an essential part of police work. Currently, the Harrisburg Bureau of Police has rifles for use in various situations, should the need to use them arise. These rifles are used primarily by the crisis response team. However, these rifles have long barrels, which limit functionality in shorter-range situations. In order to have weapons with optimal functionality, the Harrisburg police crisis response team needs to acquire rifles with shorter barrels designed more for close quarter situations. The benefit of this purchase will be to help to stop an active shooter more quickly due to increased accuracy. The direct outcome of this objective will be lives saved and a shorter time to neutralize a threat.

Fourth Priority: Vehicle Radios

The radios currently in the police vehicles for the City of Harrisburg Bureau of Police are obsolete and are not supported by the County system. This is a problem because vehicle radios are essential to the work of police officers. The Harrisburg Bureau of Police is requesting that radios in police vehicles be replaced. This purchase will lead to better communication within the Harrisburg Bureau of Police, other law enforcement agencies in nearby jurisdictions, and Dauphin County.

Fifth Priority: Motorcycles

The use of motorcycles in police work adds to the operations by giving a level of functionality that other vehicles cannot. Specifically, motorcycles allow officers to fit through tighter spaces in pursuit or heavy traffic when other vehicles cannot. The current motorcycle fleet for the Harrisburg Bureau of Police was manufactured in 1998. These motorcycles are at a point where the cost and frequency of the repairs needed are making their use not cost effective. Therefore, the Harrisburg Bureau of Police wishes to replace two motorcycles in the fleet with updated models. The 1998 models will still be used by the Bureau of Police as training

motorcycles so that officers can make their mistakes on the older motorcycles during training before ever using the new motorcycles. The value added by this purchase is to allow the Bureau of Police to continue the level of functionality added by having motorcycles, as well as allowing some of the older motorcycles to be used for training, thus lowering the risk to the newer equipment purchase.

Connection to Dauphin County/Gaming Facility

All of these purchases will lead to a safer County. The equipment purchased will lead to more crimes being solved, and more lives saved. Since criminals are not confined to just one jurisdiction, being able to solve crimes has a direct benefit for the casino and surrounding areas. If a crime is solved in Harrisburg, it is much less likely that perpetrators will make their way to the casino to cause problems. A safer Harrisburg means a safer Dauphin County.

Timeline:

If awarded local share gaming funds, the City of Harrisburg Bureau of Police will be able to purchase the equipment within six weeks after the date of the award.

Priority of Projects

The City is submitting three (3) applications for funding. The City considers all three projects to be equally important, and thus does not have a ranking of projects.

Disclose any instances of fraud or theft of applicant funds in the last five (5) years and measures taken by applicant to prevent future theft and fraudulent events.

The city has fully cooperated in each of the below-cited matters and has initiated the investigation in four (4) of the matters.

Disclosure #1 - In March 2013, the City of Harrisburg entered into a consent decree with the United States Securities and Exchange Commission agreeing to a finding that it had violated certain regulations regarding public disclosures and other public statements by elected officials. The finding was an acknowledgment that the City failed to provide timely and accurate financial disclosures over a limited window of time. **This should have no material effect on the City's current abilities to comply with the obligations of this grant.**

Disclosure #2 - In August 2014, the Treasurer of the City of Harrisburg, John Campbell, was charged with felony theft and a misdemeanor charge of unfair or deceptive acts or fraudulent conduct stemming from his alleged misappropriation of funds from the Historic Harrisburg Association, a charity where he served as Executive Director. The charity is not related to the City of Harrisburg. In September 2014, Mr. Campbell was also charged with a second theft charge in connection with his alleged misuse of funds from Capital Regional Stonewall Democrats, a political action committee where he served as Treasurer. Mr. Campbell resigned his position as Treasurer of the City of Harrisburg effective September 2, 2014. A review of the accounts of the City of Harrisburg showed no breaches. The above charges are unrelated to the duties of Mr. Campbell's position as City Treasurer and have no effect on the City's finances or its financial dealings. Mr. Campbell later pled guilty under a plea agreement, made restitution, and was placed in an Accelerated Rehabilitation Disposition program by the Court. **This should have no material effect on the City's current abilities to comply with the obligations of this grant.**

Disclosure #3 - In July 2015, a 98-page grand jury presentment was issued regarding the former Mayor of Harrisburg, Stephen R. Reed, which included 17 criminal charges, with 499 separate counts, including theft of City property, bribery, and his operation of a corrupt criminal enterprise while in office. He served as Mayor for 28 years and left office in January 2010. The indictment referred to 7 counts of bribery of former City Council members and County officials. No charges have been brought against other former officials, though the Pennsylvania Office of Attorney General publicly announced that the grand jury has been extended and that a second grand jury is anticipated to be seated. The most recent incidents occurred in 2015, in an effort to sell or consign certain firearms and related items allegedly purchased with public monies or otherwise being the alleged property of the City. In January 2017, in a plea agreement, Mr. Reed pled guilty to 2 felony and 18 misdemeanor counts related to receiving stolen property. The Office of the Attorney General agreed to dismiss the remaining charges. The stolen

property for which he pled guilty was valued at more than \$19,000. Mr. Reed was sentenced to return certain stolen property, two years of supervised probation, and a \$2,000 fine. A formal application for return of seized property that includes the issues of forfeiture and return of City property is pending. **This should have no material effect on the City's current abilities to comply with the obligations of this grant.**

Disclosure #4 - The City is cooperating in an ongoing investigation of an alleged 2013 unauthorized electronic transfer of funds from a financial account allocated for City use secured through another governmental body with whom the City interacts. The cyber breach appears to have occurred in the systems of the outside agency, but a review is ongoing. **This should have no material effect on the City's current abilities to comply with the obligations of this grant.**

Disclosure #5 - The City is cooperating in an investigation of an alleged misappropriation or misuse of 2013 and earlier City funds by a former employee. The City has modified and corrected its cash handling policies to prevent re-occurrence. **This should have no material effect on the City's current abilities to comply with the obligations of this grant.**

Disclosure #6 - A former law enforcement officer entered into a plea arrangement in January 2016 on 2014 criminal charges, wherein the original charges alleged theft of approximately \$7,500 in public and non-profit funds in 2012-2013. The officer has been terminated. **This should have no material effect on the City's current abilities to comply with the obligations of this grant.**

Disclosure #7 - In October 2016, a City police officer was charged with theft of money belonging to a federal agency and removing property to prevent its seizure. The charges resulted from an internal investigation by the Harrisburg Police Dept. The investigation was subsequently referred to the Federal Bureau of Investigation and Pennsylvania State Police. The matter is ongoing. **This should have no material effect on the City's current abilities to comply with the obligations of this grant.**

Describe any pending litigation, administrative proceedings or governmental approval that may cause delay or otherwise impact the project.

The City is not aware of any pending litigation, administrative proceedings or governmental approvals that would likely cause delay of or otherwise adversely impact the project.
