Lance discussed the above handout pointing out that the overall 2011 budget is less than what was proposed in 2010.

Chairman Maloney: Q./In looking at the Executive's budget (p. 283), why is there no funding for *Ulster Tomorrow*? A./ *Ulster Tomorrow* had some funding when we were in the promulgation phase, while we were facilitating all of the meetings and discussions for all of the 15 strategy teams. UCDC was responsible for all the logistics. After that came to a head and the Legislature adopted *Ulster Tomorrow* into the Comprehensive Plan of the County, that phase came to a close and it was time for implementation of the Plan. The implementation is what you pay us to do. Every one of the tasks that we do is an implementation of some aspect of *Ulster Tomorrow*. We are tracking what we do and will be reporting on it formally.

Legislator Donaldson: Q./ Can you get a copy of the *Ulster Tomorrow* findings for the new Legislators? A./ Yes. Also, it's readily available online on the County's website and UCDC's website.

Legislator Frey: Q./ When can we get the job creation/job loss report? We'd like to see what areas are being hit hard with job losses and what is being done to correct that, plus the creation of new positions. A./ We are focused on retention and job creation activity. We are on the verge of submitting our first claim for job growth/retention projects. The big hero is Precision Flow Technologies. We are putting in 184 jobs created and hired in 2010 to date. Legislator Frey: Q./ I know the Dept. of Labor has a report per code, per jobs lost, retained, and created. When will we get a report like that so we can look at the whole picture for Ulster County? A./ Dept. of Labor does send monthly labor reports for the Kingston MSA. There are a number of spreadsheets that show the unemployment rate and they go through the different sectors, showing what the employment level was a year ago, what it is today, average wages, etc. We can certainly share that with you.

Legislator Donaldson: Q./ Can you share that report with us via e-mail? A./ Yes, I will send it to Chairman Maloney so he can distribute it as widely as he'd like.

Chairman Maloney: Q./ Any info on Part Search? I understand they were sending people home today. A./ It is very clear there is something going on. We will be supportive and try to retain jobs if we can. I have had discussions with the people there and the former CEO. The County Exec's Office and the OneStop Job Center are in the picture on this. We should know more tonight or tomorrow morning and are definitely on it.

Chairman Maloney: Q./ In comparing the 2011 Executive's recommended budget with your handout, I fully understand that the two are intertwined but yet a little different. However, the Exec has a recommendation of \$557,500 for contractual expenses, including TSEC. You have \$634K on the revenue side, which includes both the UCDC and TSEC contracts with the county. If you don't make the mark on the rest of your revenue side, are you going to be over budget? A./ No. The TSEC \$150K is not in the budget I handed out to you, nor is the Kingston Ulster Empire Zone amount of \$7,500. So I believe it is consistent. If you minus the \$150K and the \$7.5K from the Executive's \$575.5K you get \$400K, which is equal to the two \$200K entries on my handout. It is true that if our expenses are down, we'll have a better bottom line. The opposite is true as well. We are assuming that our insurance costs are not going up. Chairman Maloney: Q./ I understand that the TSEC money is a pass thru and that's why it may not have been included, but still if you don't make the mark on your other revenue projections, you are going to have to adjust your expenses. A./ That's correct. My biggest concern in falling short would be fundraising in the private sector. It's a tough time to do that. We are doing pretty well given the current climate but will fall a little short of our goals this year. We could do a lot more if we had the resources but we do understand that money is tight. We believe that we can do our job and get a lot done with this budget.

Legislator Sweeney: Q./ Understanding the importance of pounding the pavement to keep business thriving, is your travel and marketing budget enough for your representatives to get out and speak to CEO's and other key players? A./ There are other ways we can do marketing and pay for some of our travel costs. To clarify, the line item in our budget, Professional D&M, Dues and Maintenance, includes the Hudson Valley Economic Development Corporation dues from Ulster County from UCDC for mainly marketing, but also includes some kinds of Economic Development regional activity. They do a lot of the advertising, site selection, smoozing, organizing events, and setting up of business conferences. We go to some of them ourselves and sometimes we pay for our expenses and sometimes they cover our expenses. So that's part

of what we are buying from them. That said our travel budget is thin. When we do attend conferences, it's done on the cheap. In terms of Economic Development, I believe the best return on investment of time is networking with leads that you get with your existing companies and then following up on those. That's where you have to pick up the phone or pound the pavement, and a lot of those leads are within driving distance. You have a better chance of someone coming here when they are already familiar with the area and have a connection here, i.e. a second home or like to ski in the area. Following this theory, we could do a lot with the budget with have despite it being thin.

Legislator Hayes: Q./Back to *Ulster Tomorrow*, I'm wondering if we do outreach with the Town Supervisors? A./ Yes. They are a primary partner and I speak with John Valk, facilitator of the Supervisors regularly. When we deal with projects, we deal with the Supervisors every week, sometimes everyday. We could use better communication with Supervisors on a planning basis. Getting more engaged with the Supervisors and getting their perspective is something we are working on. Legislator Hayes: I believe that if the Town Boards had a better understanding of the initiatives of *Ulster Tomorrow*, you would have better reception. Lance Matteson: Agreed. Over the last year UCDC has set up a new committee chaired by Paul Hakim called the Balanced Growth Committee. Their purpose is to promote awareness and education about economic development, both on a project by project basis and more generally, about the purpose of economic development and how it matters to your community. There has been a series of classes in conjunction with the Planning Board on how economic development works and a few Supervisors and a lot of Planning Board Members have attended. The recent class in New Paltz on pilot agreements produced a very good dialogue.

Legislator Loughran: Q./ How much space is there at Tech City total, how much is rentable, and how much is rented? A./ We use the number of 2 million square feet as a rounded number. The masterplan for the middle buildings, 1 and 3, says the best use of these buildings is as parking areas so that we can open up new Greenfield development on the North parking lot area. If you remove those, you are left with 1.6 million square feet total. 60%, so about 1 million, is leased.

Legislator Petit advised to keep an eye on Bank of America in terms of retention because they are very technology driven. With everything going electronic, the "seasonal" jobs have now been reduced to about 2 months of work.

Legislator Frey commented that he met with the developers of the Partition Street Project in Saugerties and they are moving forward with the project because of the support they have gotten from Ulster County and UCDC. I commend you and your staff. It is a great project for Saugerties and we thank you.

- Carl Meyer, CO-CEO Solar Energy Consortium (TSEC):

LEDs America has announced that they are moving to Tech City to take about 10,000 square feet. Headquartered in Jupiter, FL, they currently manufacture their LED lights in China. They are not happy with the quality of the Chinese lights. LEDs America has an aggressive R&D department which has designed new fluorescent tubes with a significantly higher life. They want to manufacture here and are on our job creation report to have up to 50 employees next year.

We've been talking with Callanan Industries, as they are very into energy & have shown interest in a solar farm.

Legislator Loughran: Q./ Do you do any work with NYPIRG? I understand they have programs that promote different types of alternative energies. A./ My sense was they were focused on energy efficiencies, but I will check their website and see if there's something there.

Carl asked if there was a new contact at the Resources Recovery Agency, as he had been working closely with them on the issue of the Ulster County landfill. Legislator Petit gave Tim Roses' contact information. Carl wants to resume conversations on the subject as Callanan's has an underpass underneath Route 32. On the concern of getting across without going through a public byway, that, he thinks, would qualify. It would allow us to put panels on the landfill and move the energy through to Callanan's. They are enthusiastic. It's something to look at.

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**Ulster County Development Corporation (UCDC)
Report of Activities and Services for 2009
For Ulster County, New York**

Introduction

This report gives highlights of the economic development activities of the Ulster County Development Corporation (“UCDC”) in the calendar year 2009, and specifically those services and deliverables set forth in the contracts between Ulster County, New York (“UC”) and UCDC for the year 2009.

UC has contracted with UCDC for four distinct functions: basic economic development services, separately identified incentivized deliverables, facilitation of implementation of the Ulster Tomorrow economic development plan (not specifically in the 2009 contract, but an implicit UCDC responsibility), and oversight of The Solar Energy Consortium (“TSEC”). The contractual requirements and metrics are the basis for this report. Reference should be made to the deliverables spelled out in the relevant contractual language governing each such function.

The four functional areas will be treated in turn below, except that TSEC oversight function has been separately reported upon.

UCDC’s Basic Economic Development Services

The contract lists ten economic development services UCDC was to perform in 2009. Each is reported on below in the order listed in the contract. All activities listed occurred in 2009, though some related activity may have been in 2008 or 2010.

1. The FIRM shall facilitate strategic community and jobs-promoting real estate development projects at strategic sites in Ulster County, including but not limited to, Tech City (Ulster), the Hydro/Schrade Complex (Warwarsing/Ellenville), and the Kings Highway Corridor (Saugerties). This work will include a minimum of four (4) on-location meetings in 2009 with each of the owners or operating principals at each such property.

UCDC held at least the following number of meetings with the respective owners, or their representatives: TechCity (12), Hydro/Schrade (5), Kings Highway (7), Winston Farm (7). In addition, we had many conference calls and related meetings.

2. The FIRM shall facilitate business and jobs retention and expansion projects for Ulster County businesses, including at least ten (10) such projects in 2009.

In addition to helping dozens of UC firms solve problems related to retention, UCDC directly facilitated 6 major jobs retention and expansion projects, involving a total of 128

retained jobs, 481 created jobs – of which 367 positions were actually filled in 2009. Total jobs retained and created in 2009: 609. The details of these projects have been documented with UCDC's invoices to the County and are summarized below in the section on separately identified incentivized deliverables. In addition to these projects, has worked actively on other retention projects and other job-creation projects, all of which are still in process.

3. The FIRM shall facilitate business and jobs recruitment projects for Ulster County, including of at least five (5) such projects in 2009. In support of this activity, the FIRM will market Ulster County externally, disseminating information on doing business in Ulster County, partnering with Hudson Valley Economic Development Corporation (HVEDC) and with the Ulster County Red Carpet Team. In 2009, the FIRM will attend at least two trade conferences that support this outcome.

UCDC directly facilitated 4 business-and-jobs recruitment projects, attended 3 trade conferences, and made a trip to China to promote exports from UC – paid for with UCDC's private funds.

4. The FIRM shall facilitate loans and financial packages for jobs retaining or creating projects of Ulster County businesses, partnering as needed with private, nonprofit and public financial institutions. A minimum of six such projects are targeted.

UCDC directly facilitated loans and financial packages for 4 jobs retention and creation projects. 3 other projects were in process of applying for such loans and financing packages in 2009.

5. The FIRM shall administer the Ulster County Shovel Ready program in accordance with its regulations and guidelines and with all applicable legal requirements. This will include support of two active Shovel Ready projects in the implementation stage, and facilitation of at least one other Shovel Ready project application.

UCDC administered 2 active Shovel Ready projects in the implementation stage (Town of Saugerties – actually 2 projects – plus Town of Lloyd – completed), and facilitated 1 other Shovel Ready feasibility project applications (Town of Gardiner – completed, Town of Marlborough – approved). UCDC also had active discussions about Shovel Ready planning and possible projects with TechCity in the Town of Ulster, with the owners of the Winston Farm in the Town of Saugerties, with the City of Kingston, as well as with other UC towns.

6. The FIRM shall partner with nonprofit, municipal, county, state, and federal legislative and executive agencies and officials to advance economic development in Ulster County, including but not limited to, the Ulster County Legislature, Ulster County Administrator, Ulster County Treasurer, Ulster County Planning Department, Ulster County Legal Department and other Departments, as well as with state and regional economic development agencies, including, but not limited to, the Empire State Development

Corporation, the Hudson Valley Economic Development Corporation, Pattern for Progress, and the Catskill Watershed Corporation.

UCDC partnered actively with all these entities, including multiple meetings, telephone calls, and email exchanges with each of these agencies.

7. The FIRM shall assist Ulster County existing businesses and startup businesses to prosper in Ulster County, by partnering with the Small Business Development Center (SBDC) and business incubators in Ulster County. This includes fielding general business inquiries for a targeted thirty (30) business per month and providing specific business assistance and services for at least forty (40) Ulster County businesses.

UCDC actively partnered with SBDC to assist existing Ulster County businesses. This included fielding general business inquiries for at least 35 businesses per month and providing specific business assistance and services for 51 Ulster County businesses.

8. The FIRM shall maintain membership, as well as be an active participant, in the Ulster County Workforce Development Board. The FIRM will also support education, training and workforce development efforts related to economic development within Ulster County. This will include participation in at least four (4) Workforce Development Board meetings on this subject in 2009.

UCDC maintained its membership, and was an active participant, in the Ulster County Workforce Development Board. UCDC participated in 9 Workforce Development Board meetings. And UCDC participated in 3 meetings at BOCES devoted to supporting education, training and workforce development efforts related to economic development within the County.

9. The FIRM shall maintain membership, as well as be an active participant, in the Ulster County Housing Consortium. The FIRM will also support housing development needs related to economic development. This will include participation in at least four (4) meetings on this subject in 2009.

UCDC maintained its membership, and was an active participant, in the Ulster County Housing Consortium. UCDC participated in 4 meetings of the Consortium.

10. The FIRM will advocate and perform public outreach and education at all levels for economic development and business in Ulster County, including participation in at least six (6) public forums related to economic development in 2009.

UCDC participated in 10 public forums related to economic and business development in the County, and participated in at least 14 media interviews and stories on this subject.

Separately Identified Incentivized Deliverables

The separate contract or addendum between the County and UCDC on incentivized activities covers jobs retained, jobs created (publicly announced), created jobs actually hired, and companies recruited. UCDC has interpreted this to mean that it can be rewarded for either recruiting a new company or for the jobs from the new company – but not both. In 2009 UCDC invoiced the County for jobs retained, created, and hired only.

The detailed documentation for the claims submitted by UCDC in 2008 has already been reviewed in detail by County officials. In summary, *a total of 609 jobs directly retained and created in 2009 with the significant involvement of UCDC. Of the 481 jobs created, 367 were already been filled in 2009. Other retained, created, and hired jobs in 2009 were support by UCDC, and many others existed in UC, but these were not included in the reported totals – which were restricted to documented jobs involving the direct, significant efforts of UCDC.*

Facilitation of the Ulster Tomorrow Economic Development Plan

The 2009 UCDC-UC contract does not specifically address the Ulster Tomorrow Sustainable Economic Development Plan, the initial formulation of which was completed. But UCDC in 2009 continued to facilitate its implementation with its co-sponsors, the UCIDA and the UC Planning Department, and its other community partners. A separate report on implementation progress to date is forthcoming.

Figures were requested on ridership on the New Paltz Loop by Legislator Rodriguez and the number of runs through Saugerties by Legislator Sweeney. Would you be so kind and pass these figures to both Legislators and the rest of the Committee:

New Paltz Loop ridership year to date- 26,420

Saugerties Runs - Increased from 8 per day to 12 per day

Saugerties Stops - Increased from 1 stop per day with 2 stops on request to 5 stops per day

Ridership year to date - 19,902 . Route went into effect 2/1/2010

New Paltz loop is in it's second year and is a more mature route. We expect the Saugerties route to run the same progression as it matures. The Saugerties Kawanis is in the process of promoting the Saugerties route and will purchase free passes for limited trips on the new service.
